- One: In the midst of uncertain times, we remind ourselves not just of what could be but of what will be.

Central Plains Mennonite Conference News: In July of this year Jerry Thex, who had taken over as the pastor of the Ashland Christian Fellowship in Montana, informed us that the community no longer had enough people to sustain a church.

There are a lot of different reasons for this and while we are sad about the closing of the church, we praise God for many years of Anabaptist Christian witness in the Ashland community. Scott and Suzette Shreffler from the White River Cheyenne Church and the other members of the Northern Cheyenne Mennonite Churches, along with conference leadership, have been working to figure out what can be done with the property.

At this point, what we need is a group of folks who are interested in heading out to Ashland to clean up the property. Scott and a friend went recently and cut back the grass that had grown quite tall, but there is need for a group to clean up brush piles, clean out fence rows and clean up weeds. World Communion Sunday and its Historical Development

Today, Christians around the globe are celebrating World Communion Sunday. This first Sunday in October offers congregations a distinct opportunity to share bread and cup in Holy Communion as part of the global faith community.

Whether shared in a grand cathedral, outside on a hilltop, in a meetinghouse, in a storefront, in a small church, on a farm, or in the heart of the city, communion practices vary as much as there are congregations. Some will receive cubes of bread or a wafer, while others will tear from a common loaf. Some will drink from a common chalice or their own individual glass, while others will dip a piece of bread into the cup. Clergy, dressed in traditional, formal, and informal garments will lead a variety of liturgies in many languages.

Even with all of the differences, the key word for World Communion Sunday is unity. We celebrate our unity in Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior. We share in the almost-universal Christian practice of breaking bread and drinking the cup with all who follow in Jesus's way of peace. We join together across time and space in remembering the night of Jesus' betrayal and the day of Jesus' suffering, death, and sacrifice. This special day also gives us just the slightest taste of Pentecost when people from around the first-century Mediterranean world were empowered to understand each other and come together in and by the Holy Spirit's power.

Although World Communion Sunday is familiar to our congregation, some may not know the story of its beginnings. Originally called World Wide Communion Sunday, it is a gift of the Presbyterian Church to the larger global Christian community.

The first celebration occurred at Shadyside Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh, PA, in 1933. From its inception, its purposes included bringing churches together, inspiring and informing people across traditions and practices, highlighting how important the Church of Jesus Christ is to the healing of all of creation, and reminding all congregations of their interconnected existence in the global church.

Celebrations of World Communion Sunday spread very slowly among churches at the start. During the global instability and disruption of the Second World War, it became more prevalent because the world seemed to be falling apart. World Wide Communion symbolized the effort to hold things together, in a spiritual sense by emphasizing unity in the Spirit and the good news of Jesus. World-Wide Communion Sunday was adopted as a denominational practice in the Presbyterian Church (US) in 1936, but it wasn't until 1940 when the Federal Council of Churches (a predecessor body of the National Council of Churches) promoted extending the celebration to a number of churches around the world that the practice became widespread.

Today, World Communion Sunday is celebrated around the world, demonstrating that the church founded on Jesus Christ peacefully shares God-given goods in a world increasingly destabilized by globalization and global market economies based on greed. We join our Christian siblings around the globe today, knowing that Christ's call to follow transcends all boundaries, borders, languages, cultures, and experiences. Amen and amen.
